How to get to the venue

Padua is conveniently served by two main **airports**, Venice Marco Polo (VCE) and Venice Treviso (TSF). Bus lines connect both airports to Padua's coach station, located next to the city's train station. VCE bus info and timetables are available here, while info and timetables of TSF buses are available here. In both cases, tickets can be purchased in the arrival hall. The Department is located in **via del Santo 33**, in the city centre. It can be reached by foot from the train station (a 20-minute walk), or you can take the tramline southbound (headed for "Capolinea sud") and get off at "Ponti Romani" (a 3-minute walk from the Department). You'll find the tram stops 70 m on your right as you exit the station. Tickets can be purchased at the newspaper kiosk.
